When you support the Mobile Pantry, you are supporting many of the most vulnerable populations in our community, including seniors, children and veterans who are food insecure. Thank you for your donations to Mobile Pantry and to the volunteers who help us set up and distribute food.

The Mobile Pantry distributes food in locations that are not well-served by pantries. Clients can go to these sites to receive non-perishable food, as well as fresh produce and baked goods.

The Mobile Pantry operates at several low-income housing sites in addition to other locations throughout Monmouth and Ocean Counties.

Last year the Mobile served an average of 905 families per month in underserved areas, including 420 low-income seniors.



FoodBank Network Agency Profile: Greater Tuckerton Food Pantry

Greater Tuckerton Food Pantry serves 200 families and more than 500 women and children per month, and the numbers are increasing, due in part to the closures of the casinos in the area.

"People went from having full time jobs with benefits and all the things that come with that like nice homes and cars, to job hunting and scrambling to figure out how to make ends meet," said Penny Hughes, Pantry Director. "It's a shock for them to be

without the funds for food after paying bills and worrying about unemployment. We also have families in our community who are still displaced after Superstorm Sandy. But our staff of volunteers is here to help."

The pantry has recently received refrigeration and a van with the help of FoodBank grants and outreach specialists visit there to provide needed services beyond food like help with Healthcare and SNAP applications, as well as free tax preparation. "We also partner with other local nonprofits that provide clothing for job





interviews. We do all we can to help people get back on their feet again," said Hughes.

Many thanks to all the dedicated and wonderful volunteers who provide support here - this site is run completely by volunteers and includes a community garden that clients can use to grow their own produce. The Greater Tuckerton Food Pantry is located at 148 Green Street, in Tuckerton, and is open Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 9:00-12:00 PM.

Outstanding Volunteer Receives County-Wide

Award for her Service

Mai-Uyen Nguyen, a FoodBank volunteer, recently received a prestigious volunteer recognition award at the annual SCAN (Social Community Activities Network) Leaders of Distinction Luncheon for her service to SCAN, The FoodBank and other nonprofits.

When Ms. Nguyen retired from AT&T in 2015 after years as a global systems engineer, she knew she wanted to volunteer for nonprofits committed to alleviating poverty and building sustainable communities. She chose the FoodBank as one of her regular stops. "Having been in the corporate world for over 30 years, I know how hard it is to be efficient but at the same time compassionate. It's very hard to be lean without being mean, but I feel the FoodBank is achieving that balance."

She began volunteering at the FoodBank by helping distribute food at our mobile pantries and then became a trained Volunteer Income Tax Assistance tax preparer. While she continues those volunteer activities, she is also now helping to configure and launch new volunteer management software.
