Official launch of the new brand took place at Neptune headquarters in May and included signage unveiling, a press conference and a lively parade on the premises, complete with trucks, volunteer walkers, and the Neptune High School Marching Band!

The FoodBank of Monmouth and Ocean Counties announced it is now doing business as **Fulfill** to communicate the many ways we are working to end hunger in the community. “We changed our name because we are evolving and invite our neighbors and partners to mobilize and engage in the many hunger-fighting services that help shorten the food line and add to the bottom line of families in need. Because ending hunger in our community is a complex challenge, it takes a comprehensive approach to provide the resources people need to maintain active, healthy lifestyles,” says Carlos Rodriguez, Executive Director.

Fulfill programs include nutritious food distribution, kids’ feeding programs, mobile and pediatric pantries, free tax preparation, SNAP and healthcare enrollment assistance, and culinary job training and placement.

Hunger in Monmouth and Ocean Counties is no longer a crisis that can be remedied with emergency food

alone. Fulfill distributes more than 12 million meals to 132,000 people, including 40,000 children in Monmouth and Ocean Counties, and partners with more than 300 feeding programs that include food pantries, soup kitchens, senior centers and group homes – and 95 cents of every dollar donated goes directly to those in need. Fulfill receives a 4-star, highest ranking on Charity Navigator.

Fulfill operates in two locations: 3300 Route 66 in Neptune and at The B.E.A.T. Center, 1769 Hooper Avenue in the Silverton Plaza Toms River. - **The B.E.A.T. Center partners provided more than \$7 million in food and resources** including over 1,900 volunteer hours in the first 12 months since opening in Ocean County

Summer Meals Success

Thanks to YOU... kids who depend on school lunch programs did not have to go without a meal this summer.

This year, Fulfill provided the most meals to summer programs since it began in 2012. We have 25 sites within Monmouth & Ocean Counties.



“We did a much improved job of reaching eligible low-income families with help from YMCA Community Centers, the New Jersey Department of Agriculture and our generous donors,” said Fulfill Network Engagement Manager, Wendi Silver. “It’s wonderful to see kids get nutritious breakfasts and lunches so they have the energy to play and enjoy the summer, and it’s a great relief for families who struggle to afford both the costs of seasonal daycare and additional meals.”

Here at the Freehold Community YMCA Summer Food Service Program, children were served chicken breast with cheese on whole wheat bread, a fresh plum, carrot sticks with low-fat dip and one percent milk.

Grants Provide Funding for Key Programs

Fulfill’s Mobile Pantry brings nutritious food to neighborhoods where people can’t access a food pantry due to distance or mobility/transportation limitations. Each month, the Mobile Pantry brings food directly to more than 1,000 individuals, including persons with disabilities, seniors, and families. Last year, grants from the Wakefern Food Corporation, Wawa Foundation, and Walmart Foundation helped the Mobile Pantry distribute more than 318,000 meals. We’d like to extend a special thank you to these community leaders for ensuring that no one in our area goes hungry!



Local Scout Builds NEW Produce Wash Station for Fulfill’s Organic Garden

Thanks to Boy Scout Matthew Redbord from Troop 76 in Wayside, Fulfill now has a new wash station for our Volunteer Organic Garden, which is greatly appreciated!

Matt wanted to build something for his Eagle Scout Project that would contribute to our garden. After meeting with Garden Coordinator Jess Sinkhorn, they decided the wash station was a perfect way to get the fresh picked produce from the garden to the pantries cleaned and ready for cooking. “It’s a solution we have needed to provide for a while,” said Jess.

Matt was responsible for designing the

station, securing volunteer help, raising funds, buying materials and building the sturdy structure.

The project took more than a year to plan and six weekends to build. “I want to thank Fulfill for giving me this opportunity. I also want to acknowledge the incredible support from the scouts, dads, neighbors, and friends who assisted. I couldn’t have done it without you,” says Matt.



Meet Gordon

He was in the middle of treatment for esophageal cancer when he lost his job and the healthcare benefits that were included. When he explained this to the hospital social worker, Dale, she promptly contacted Fulfill, asking for assistance and setting up an appointment with Susan, a Fulfill Resource Connections team member.

Since he lost his healthcare benefits, Gordon could not receive his cancer medications, get the necessary tests to track its progression, or schedule the surgery that could save his life. He needed an insurance policy that would provide the doctors, tests, medicine, and treatments needed to bring him to recovery. He had almost given up hope in finding that care until he was introduced to a Fulfill specialist who had access and experience in the marketplace.

Gordon now has an inexpensive plan, with zero deductible, that took effect August 1st. His appointments are scheduled, his doctor visits have resumed, and his medications can be taken without interruption.

“I am so grateful to Dale, who knew to call Fulfill in order to get me the help I needed to continue my treatment. I am hopeful for the future and happy to know that I’m in good hands,” says Gordon.

I grew up in a family that loved to cook and I remember as a child I enjoyed being with my grandfather who had a food truck and sold hot dogs and hamburgers. One of the many things I love about food is the memories that it conjures up of moments long forgotten. I can take a bite of my favorite foods and they transport me back to happy times in my life. But life wasn't always so easy.

As an adult, I was a licensed cosmetologist and I lost my job during the recession. When my lease ran out and I still couldn't find work, I had to make the difficult decision to pack up my things and live out of my car. I was hungry and scared and not sure what to do next. Every day was a struggle. I felt I had hit rock bottom and I knew I had to figure something out, so I finally had to push pride aside and utilize the help that was available to me. I had to have enough sustenance to keep going.

I heard about Fulfill's Culinary Training Program from the JBJ Soul Kitchen,

and I knew I had nothing more to fall back on so I applied. It was a life-changing decision. I became the valedictorian and won a scholarship award at graduation.
